

What are we seeking to receive?


We aim to become receptive to the influences coming from our Higher Centers.

Our Higher Intellectual Center and Higher Emotional Center are fully developed and constantly working, but we do not hear them.

Maurice Nicoll equates our Higher Centers with the Conscious Circle of Humanity and "Greater Mind."

How do we become more receptive?

"Only by work on oneself."

Through the *purification* or *balancing* of our lower centers.

Maurice Nicoll says one definition of the Work is "the preparation of lower centers for the reception of the Influences coming from Higher Centers..."

Our genuine Work efforts are never wasted.

How do these ideas relate with our theological tradition?

Maurice Nicoll connects our ability to hear Higher Centers to being "born of the Spirit."

Beryl Pogson relates these higher influences in religious terms as the Holy Ghost.

Our reception of these higher influences guides our everyday discernment.

It is our connection to the Mind of Christ.

Receptivity: The Work of the Spirit



1 Corinthians 2:14-16



Consent: Our "Yes" to God in Each Moment




Consent in "Open Mind, Open Heart"

"An act of will expressing acceptance of someone, some thing, or some course of action; the manifestation of one's intention."

- 1. Choose a sacred word as the symbol of your intention to consent to God's presence and action within.
- 2. Sitting comfortably and with eyes closed, settle briefly, and silently introduce the sacred word as the symbol of your **consent to God's presence and action within**.

Consent: Our "Yes" to God in Each Moment



The Role of the Sacred Word

"The sacred word is a way of letting go of all thoughts.

This makes it possible for our spiritual faculties,
which are attracted to interior silence, to move
spontaneously in that direction. Such a movement
does not require effort. It only requires the willingness
to let go of our ordinary preoccupations."

The Welcoming Prayer: Consent on the Go



The Welcoming Prayer is a method of consenting to God's presence and action in **our physical and emotional reactions** to events and situations in daily life.

The purpose of the Welcoming Prayer is to deepen our relationship with God through consenting in the ordinary activities of our day.

The Welcoming Prayer: Consent on the Go



Step 1: **Feel and sink into** what you are experiencing this moment in your body.

Step 2: **"Welcome"** what you are experiencing this moment in your body as an opportunity to consent to the Divine Indwelling.

Step 3: **Let go** by saying "I let go of my desire for security, affection, control and embrace this moment as it is."


Consent over the Lifespan: The Four Consents



Thomas Keating's teaching, based on the theology of John S. Dunne:

- 1. Consent to the basic goodness of our nature with all its parts.
- 2. Consent to the full development of our being by activating our talents and creative energies.
- 3. Consent by accepting our non-being and diminutions of self that occur through illness, old age, and death.
- 4. Consent to be transformed.

Entrusting Ourselves to God



Cultivating Trust: Unceasing Prayer of the Heart







"Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me, a sinner."


Cultivating Trust: The Jesus Prayer


Our Engine of Transformation


Through the cultivation of our trust in God, we are empowered to consent ever-more deeply.

Through our deepening consent, our emotional center becomes balanced and purified, which allows for greater receptivity from our Higher Centers and the Holy Spirit.


Through the direct experience of these graces (assistance, blessing, inspiration, guidance, and vivifying force), our trust and confidence in God grows.
